

These are the words our Board Chair Brad Bauer warmly gave at the opening of the 75th Anniversary Celebration conference at Green Lake in August. As Sandra Wimpelberg put it, "our house is in Tennessee, but our home is Green Lake." The stories in the enclosed 75th Anniversary Commemorative Book paint pictures of this 'Home.'

"When we drive through the gates we know we are 'Home.' The many nooks and crannies to walk, read, or just sit and enjoy solitude by the lake make it easy to get back into union with yourself, with nature and with God" (see the Saunders story on p. 44). The Mottrams "love the beauty of Green Lake – set aside for Christian fellowship. We love the learning, playing, sharing and worshipping. There is no distance when you are at Green Lake – with God or others" (p. 36).

"Green Lake is a place of peaceful calm, a sheltered cove from the storms we experience in life" for Jane Smith (p. 40), as it was for the Lawsons. For some who have experienced a lifetime of prejudice or abuse, Green Lake is a first experience of true Christian community. Susan Soria remembers making friends with an African American couple with whom they stayed in Stambaugh House for a conference in 1958. "When it came time to leave, the wife cried because she said this is the first place where they had been treated as just two other people" (p. 31).

Green Lake has imnpacted multiple generations in families such as Sarah Purpura, her parents Mike and Dawn, and her grandparents the Kimseys. Sarah is "thankful for Green Lake's display of God's beauty. I love to walk through the grounds hearing the carillon, thinking of how God has woven my family's story into this place, and how He continues to be faithful to us and so many other people through the ministry of Green Lake" (pp. 45–46).

"Green Lake is always at the cutting edge. It made me a better pastor," says Edward Heist (p. 51). God has fulfilled the inspired 1943 purpose statement to nurture and train leaders for the cause of Christianity in ways that go infinitely beyond what we dare hope or imagine. Take a look at the stories of Rachel Bediako, Pastor Seth and more.

For all this, we give God all the glory. God can then do infinitely more than we dare hope or imagine in the next 75 years (Ephesians 3: 20). We cannot wait.

As World War II was at its peak in 1944, the need for this sacred place for closer walks with God, nurturing and training Christian leaders was obvious when Green Lake began.
